President's Message

Hi Everyone,

SB250 is dead! At least for now. It is certain to be resurrected in some form for the next legislative session, but until 2010 we can all breathe more easily. Don't lose track of the Concerned Dog Owners of California website <u>www.cdoca.org</u> or the instant letter writer <u>www.saveourdogs.net</u> because we will need them again next year. Many thanks to everyone who took the time to oppose every revision of the bill. Unfortunately, this is what has to be done to convince legislators that you are serious about your opposition.

The Conformation clinic was a huge success thanks to the planning efforts of Denise Coler and Ron Morelos, and the great instruction and advice of Sandra Flanigan and Margaret Stanard. Both ladies said they observed enormous improvement in both dogs and handlers between the beginning and end of the classes. Plans are in the works to hold another clinic series in the spring of 2010 before the LRCSC Specialty. Don't forget the upcoming San Diego club match on October 4 and our own LRCSC B-OB match on October 10.

Working Certificate Training Days are set for September 27 and October 3 – look for the flyer inside the Review. The LRCSC Board has voted to revise the CWA guidelines and instructions to judges to conform to those of the LRC Inc Working Certificate. This revision will apply to the upcoming Working Certificate test. One major change will be no long water retrieves, since the objective of that test is to demonstrate willingness to re-enter the water and not swimming conditioning. The LRC, Inc Working Certificate is available to any AKC registered Labrador that meets the test criteria. It is not necessary for the owner to be a member of LRC, Inc.

Sue Terpstra will be in charge of the Hunt Test Raffle. If you have donations or can help with selling tickets for a while during the Hunt Test, please contact her. This is a great opportunity for anyone who is new to and possibly interested in field work to get a feel for it while helping the club bring in the funds that enable us to put on these programs. Our raffles frequently are the difference between profit and loss at our events.

There are tentative plans for an optional Health Clinic after the Hunt Test, at which DNA specimens will be collected to screen for one or all of the following mutations: Exercise Induced Collapse (EIC), Centronuclear Myopathy (CNM) also known as Labrador Muscular Myopathy, and possibly Optigen (PRA). Details may be available by the time the Review goes to press, or contact Sue Terpstra or Ron Morelos.



Why pets are good for kids

Dogs and other animals can help children cope with a variety of ailments like depression, emotional disorders, and even poor immune function.

Pets are also good preventive medicine for healthy children to help them avoid developing allergies, increasing weight, or becoming social outcasts. Pets can also teach children empathy and compassion.

"Children in dog-owning families have more traditional values, better academic achievement, and greater respect for their parents," said Elizabeth Omerod, companion animal veterinary surgeon, and member of the Pet Health Council in London. "I often witness positive attitudinal changes in young people following the introduction of animals to their lives."

Medical Advantages

This isn't just anecdotal hearsay; it's the subject of numerous medical studies conducted around the world, many of which are found at the Delta Society.

- A Swedish study found that pet exposure during the first year of life was associated with a lower prevalence of allergic rhinitis and asthma in children ages 7 to 13 years old
- A large-scale survey of 11,000 Australians, Chinese, and Germans found that pet owners made up to 20 percent fewer annual visits to the doctor than non-pet owners
- A study of 256 children, ages 5 to 11 years, in three schools in England and Scotland found that kids with pets had fewer sick days
- A study of 100 children younger than 13 years who owned cats found that more than 80 percent said they got along better with family and friends
- Studies have linked family ownership of a pet with high self-esteem in young children and greater cognitive development
- Children with pets at home score significantly higher on empathy and prosocial scales than non-pet owners

Stress Busters on a Leash

What is it about animals that makes them so special around children? Experts overwhelmingly zone in on their ability to decrease stress because they offer love and affection unconditionally.

In one survey, 70 percent of families reported an increase in family happiness and fun after they acquired a pet. Also, the presence of a dog during a child's physical examination or dental treatment has been found to decrease the child's stress and anxiety.

"When under stress, our chemical make-up changes, and a multitude of stress hormones are introduced in the body," said Caryn Sabes Hacker, a psychotherapist with more than twenty-five years of experience with children, and author of *A Bully Grows Up: Erik Meets the Wizard*.

"Ultimately, these hormones cause inflammation in our cells. Petting an animal, hearing its soft breathing, feeling its heart beat, looking into its sweet eyes, knowing that the pet needs us and that we need the pet, creates feelings of love and a corresponding influx of chemicals from the brain that are calming and comforting and create a sense of well-being and happiness," she said.

Families across the world have harnessed one of the most powerful medicines of all--unconditional love from a furry, four-legged healthcare worker who is on-call twenty-four hours a day and doesn't require a paycheck.

Caution in Feeding Chicken Jerky to Dogs

Consumer Update

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) continues to caution consumers about a potential association between the development of illness in dogs and the consumption of chicken jerky products. The products—also called chicken tenders, strips, or treats—are imported from China. FDA continues to receive complaints of sick dogs that their owners or veterinarians associate with eating chicken jerky products. FDA issued a cautionary warning to consumers in September 2007.

Australian news organizations report that the University of Sydney is also investigating an association between illness in dogs and the consumption of chicken jerky in Australia. At least one firm in Australia has recalled their chicken jerky product and the recall notification stated the product was manufactured in China.

What is FDA Doing?

- FDA, in addition to several veterinary diagnostic laboratories in the United States, is working to find out why these products are associated with illness in dogs. To date, scientists have not been able to determine a precise cause for the reported illnesses.
- FDA has conducted extensive chemical and microbial testing but has not identified any contaminant.
- FDA continues to actively investigate the problem. Many of the illnesses reported may be the result of causes other than eating chicken jerky.

Tips for Consumers

- Do not substitute chicken jerky products for a balanced diet. The products are intended to be used occasionally and in small quantities. Owners of small dogs must be especially careful to limit the amount of these products.
- If you choose to feed your dog chicken jerky products, watch the dog closely.
 Stop feeding the product if your dog shows any of the following signs, which may occur within hours to days after feeding the product:

- decreased appetite, although some dogs may continue to eat the treats instead of other foods

- decreased activity
- vomiting
- diarrhea, sometimes with blood
- increased water drinking or increased urination
- Call your veterinarian if signs are severe or last for more than 24 hours. Blood tests may indicate kidney failure (increased urea nitrogen and creatinine). Urine tests may indicate Fanconi syndrome (increased glucose). Although most dogs appear to recover, some reports to FDA have involved dogs that have died.
- Consumers and veterinarians should report cases of animal illness associated with pet foods or treats to the <u>FDA</u> <u>Consumer Complaint Coordinator</u> listed for their area.

Halloween Safety Tips for Dogs

Holidays stress dogs and Halloween can be fairly scary for him. Each Halloween, veterinarians nationwide see injuries that could have been avoided. By following a few simple tips, you can help to avoid injuries.

* Costumes may frighten some dogs so walk them before the goblins come out.

* If you are giving out candy, be sure to keep your dog in a safe room away from the door. A door constantly opening & closing, lots of commotion and strange people in strange costumes increases the risk of your dog running out and the possibility of being hit by a car.

* Make sure your dog is wearing an up-todate I.D. tag.

the room with some soft music will also help to calm his nerves.




Retriever Review * Crating your dog is also an excellent idea. It will make him feel more secure and prevent him from running out the door.

* Keep your dog inside with you. Over the years, there have been reports of taunting, poisonings and even theft.

* Remind your family and children how dangerous treats, as well as candy wrappers, are to dogs. Designate a place, that is out of reach of your dog, to keep them & make sure everyone knows where it is.

* Burning candles are dangerous. Dogs can easily knock them down creating a mess of wax and even starting a fire.

* Most dogs aren't used to wearing costumes so don't start now. If they aren't used to it, it can cause a health hazard. If you do dress him up, make sure he can still use all of his senses: breathing, seeing and hearing. Dogs will chew & eat almost anything so be sure to remove anything that dangles, could be chewed or swallowed and avoid using rubber bands. They can cut off circulation and cut the skin if accidentally left on.



This is a young Labrador a few days after being bitten by a rattlesnake. He was hospitalized for several weeks and accumulated a very large veterinary bill. Some of the area around the bite on the head died, and this dog now has permanent conformational damage to his head. This could have been prevented had this dog previously received a rattlesnake vaccine."

Halloween is around the corner and I have heard chocolate is toxic to dogs. Is this true?

Yes. Chocolate is very toxic to dogs. The toxic ingredient is a Methyxanthine called Theobromide. It primarily affects the neurologic and cardiac systems, and signs will usually be noted 1-4 hours after ingestion of toxic doses. Signs include tremors, an elevated heart rate and breathing rate, increased urination, seizures, vomiting, high or low blood pressure, high temperature, coma and death. In dogs that survive, pancreatitis may also occur because of the high fat content in chocolate. The toxic dose of chocolate depends on the type of chocolate ingested (because they have different concentrations of Theobromide). Thus, a toxic dose for a 65 pound Labrador would be about 50 oz of Milk Chocolate, 22 oz of Dark Chocolate, 7 oz of Baking Chocolate or 4 oz or dry Cocoa Powder. In addition, Cocoa Mulch used for gardens, chocolate cookies and other chocolate containing products are also very toxic, and should be avoided. If your dog ingests chocolate containing products, induce vomiting with 1 mL of 3% Hydrogen Peroxide orally per pound of body weight, but give no more than 30 mL total. Then seek veterinarian attention immediately.

I noticed my veterinarian now carries rattlesnake vaccines. Is this something I should vaccinate my dogs against?

It is definitely something you should consider. Many areas in Southern California are habitats to rattlesnakes (particularly the Western Diamondback Rattlesnake). Habitats include grasslands, forests, plains, canyons, deserts, areas near trash piles, junk yards and more. Approximately 150,000 dogs and cats are bitten annually by venomous snakes. Rattlesnake bites can easily kill a dog. If the dog survives, the bite can cause permanent damage to the liver, kidneys, and heart and can cause death of the skin and muscles. It is severely painful to the dog, may require weeks of hospitalization and can cost thousands of dollars in veterinary bills. In addition, many veterinary hospitals do not carry anti-venin for treatment because of it's high cost and lack of availability. If you live in a rattlesnake area, this vaccine would benefit you by providing added protection. If your dog gets bitten, this vaccine will delay the onset of symptoms, result in less severe symptoms, result in less or no treatment needed, and result in a faster recovery time. Rattlesnake vaccines should be administered twice, 4 weeks apart and then boostered once every 6-12 months. Booster vaccines should be given at the beginning of rattlesnake season, in about March or April each year. Now is the perfect time to get your dogs' initial vaccine series to be just in time for there boosters in the Spring.

I was recently told I should be testing my breeding Labradors for Exercise Induced Collapse (EIC). What is EIC and how do I test for it?

Exercise Induced Collapse (EIC) is the most common reason for excitement related collapse in young, apparently normal Labrador Retrievers. Although it is primarily seen in Labradors, it can also affect other types of retrievers. Affected dogs cannot tolerate strenuous exercise such as hunting and may not even be able to tolerate a high level of excitement or repetitive retrieves. During times of such activity or excitement, the rear limbs become weak, uncoordinated and unable to support weight. The dogs' body temperature will become very elevated and some dogs will die during an EIC episode. Affected dogs are rarely able to continue in hunting training or competition. The good news is that you can prevent this syndrome from affecting you line by simply having EIC tests done on your breeding Labradors and by selectively breeding. EIC is thought to have an autosomal recessive mode of inheritance. Thus, if you plan on breeding you dogs (especially hunting dogs), you should have an EIC test done by your veterinarian. It is a simple procedure requiring only a sample of blood.
